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Campus Facilities

The Joseph Krauskopf Memorial Library – The College’s Library has combined print collections (circulating, reference, bound periodicals) totaling approximately 50,000 volumes of books and bound periodicals. specifically supporting the College’s academic program areas. Current subscriptions are held for over 725 periodicals, scholarly journals, and newspapers. There are approximately 125,000 units of film and fiche in the microform collection. The Library also has an extensive collection of reference materials including the following electronic databases: IAC Searchbank, Academic Press’ Idealibrary, Lexis-Nexis, Britannica On-line, Merriam-Webster Dictionary, and Wilson full-text databases. The collections reflect the curriculum needs of the College and are central to the educational programs.

Membership is maintained with the Tri-State College Library Consortium enabling students to draw upon the resources of thirty other academic libraries in the Philadelphia metro region.

The Library Archives include the history of the College and its founder, Joseph Krauskopf.

Friends of the Library is the support group that works to enhance collections and add support to the College Library.

The Student Center – The Student Center is a multi-purpose building housing the following offices: Student Life, Student Government, Student Activities, the Cornucopia Year Book Office, the Ram Pages (College newspaper) Office, the Music Department, the Office of Events, and the Post Office. Also located in the Student Center are the Commuter Lounge, the Snack Bar, and several conference/meeting rooms including the Rosenfeld Room, The Sigety Room, the All-Purpose Room and the Coffee House.

The Media Center - The Media Center is located in Eisner Hall and provides students and faculty with the necessary resources and equipment to support their classroom needs. Students are assisted in producing their own videocassettes, slides, overhead transparencies and graphic materials for classroom presentations. The Media Center Coordinator is Mr. James Linden (LindenL@devalcol.edu). The Media Center’s telephone number is 215-489-2387.

The Writing Center – The College’s English Department operates the Writing Center which is located in Miller Hall, the Writing Center offers students help with college level writing skills, access to faculty and trained student facilitators, and writing workshops on the most common grammatical and rhetorical problems. The Learning Center – Located in Segal Hall, the Learning Center provides peer tutoring across the curriculum for all college students. The primary focus is on freshman and sophomore level courses although tutoring is also available in many upper division classes. In addition to course specific tutoring, the Learning Center provides assistance with more generic study skills such as note taking, text reading, exam preparation, and time management through individual appointments and workshops offered through the academic year. There is also a computer laboratory in the Learning Center with twelve networked computers which students may use independently or in conjunction with tutorials. The Counseling Center – The Counseling Center is located in Segal Hall. The Counseling Center supports students with defining and accomplishing personal and academic goals. Professional Counselors provide individual and group counseling services to students throughout their college experience. Counselors assist students in resolving a broad range of issues including balancing work obligations, family and school, stress management, substance abuse and other personal concerns. When necessary, the Counseling Center staff will arrange outside referrals to community providers. Learning Support Services – is a resource for students with disabilities. Located in Segal Hall, the Office of Learning Support Services strives to provide reasonable accommodations and equal access to the College's educational programs and activities for students with disabilities. The Office offers a variety of academic support services directed at student achievement and adjustment in college. In addition, Learning Support Services serves as a liaison within the College community, an information center, and a referral source on disability related issues.

The Henry Schmieder Arboretum – the Arboretum is campus-wide and serves as a unique outdoor laboratory for the College and other educational institutions, and as an important resource for the community, organizations, ornamental horticulture industry, and the gardening public. The Arboretum is open to the public daily, and self-guided and conducted tours of the arboretum and greenhouses are available.

The Dairy Cattle Center – is a hands-on teaching and learning facility featuring 60 milking cows, with special focus on Holstein, Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, and Jersey breeds. The Center is very active with dairy cattle embryo production and embryo merchandising. The Dairy Cattle Center also maintains a string of show animals.

The Kenneth W. and Helen H. Gemmill Center for Animal Husbandry – This Center is a complete facility for the management of livestock which includes a livestock farm with about 40 beef cattle (both Herefords and Angus), 50 Suffolk and Dorset sheep, and 50 Yorkshire swine.

Mandell Science Building –The Mandell Science Building houses biology and chemistry laboratories, instrument rooms, a physics laboratory, a food science laboratory and a food processing pilot plant, as well as classrooms and faculty offices.

The Feldman Agricultural Building – houses the College’s Information Services Center, plant science and animal science laboratories, freshman biology and chemistry laboratories, and numerous classrooms and faculty offices.

The Arthur Poley Greenhouse Complex – The 13,000 square foot Greenhouse Complex houses individually controlled greenhouses and is a state-of-the-art glass and Aluminum facility that is totally computer controlled. Other amenities include rolling benches, an automated watering system, a headhouse, and conservatory.
